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SIGNIFICANT GENERAL PERMITS

DIVISION OF WATER RIGHTS Permitting and Enforcement Branch

Annual Water Use Reporting Compliance: In early May 2026, the Division of Water Rights issued approximately 244 Notices of Violation to water right holders who failed to submit required [annual water use reports](#) for Water Year 2025. Since the notices were issued, 75 water right holders have created [CalWATRS](#) accounts and submitted overdue reports. The Division continues to conduct compliance outreach and pursue appropriate enforcement actions for remaining noncompliant water right holders.

Measurement and Reporting Compliance: In late May 2026, the Division issued approximately 48 Notices of Deficiency to water right holders who submitted incomplete or deficient Alternative Compliance Plans (ACPs) under the Board's [Measurement and Reporting Regulations](#). The Division is working with diverters to address deficiencies and ensure compliance with applicable measurement and reporting requirements.

Scott and Shasta River Enforcement Activities: The Division is actively assessing compliance with recent [curtailment orders](#) and [local cooperative solutions](#) in the Scott and Shasta River watersheds. Activities include reviewing diversion information, monitoring available data sources, conducting field investigations, and taking appropriate enforcement actions where violations are identified.

Bay Delta, Hearings, and Special Projects Branch

Sacramento River Temperature Management Plan: On June 1, 2026, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) submitted a Sacramento River Temperature Management Plan (TMP) for approval pursuant to Board Order 90-5. The TMP describes how Reclamation will operate its facilities to meet temperature requirements for the preservation of salmon that spawn and live below Shasta Reservoir. The Executive Director issued a letter objecting to the TMP on June 10, 2026. Approval of the TMP may be reconsidered if Reclamation modifies the TMP to address concerns described in the letter. The Division of Water Rights will continue working with Reclamation to improve temperature management planning in the future, including by participating in Reclamation's guidance document development process, which aims to better define Sacramento River temperature management planning under the 2025 LTO, while also complying with Order 90-5. Water Quality Certification, Flow, Data, and Administrative Branch

Scott River and Shasta River Watersheds: The Board's 2025 [Emergency Regulation](#) remains in effect under [Assembly Bill 263](#) and curtailments have been reinstated in both watersheds as described below. Additionally, Division of Water Rights staff are working on a variety of long-term flow-related items for the Scott River and Shasta River watersheds as directed by Board [Resolution No. 2024-0036](#).

- **Scott River Watershed Curtailments:** Flows continued to decline in the Scott River watershed with the lack of snowpack, higher than average temperatures, and diversions. Surface water rights were initially curtailed this irrigation season on May 21, 2026 ([Addendum 9](#)). Improved flows associated with the curtailments and limited precipitation led to conditional curtailments in late May and early June ([Addenda 10](#) and [11](#)). As of June 9, all surface water was again fully curtailed ([Addendum 12](#)) and a groundwater curtailment order ([Order WR 2026-0008-DWR](#)) was issued on June 10. The groundwater curtailment order allows diversions for those with pending or approved groundwater local cooperative solutions.
- **Shasta River Watershed Curtailments:** Flows began to sharply decline in the Shasta River watershed on June 11, 2026, dropping below the May 1 - September 15 flow requirement (50 cfs) on June 13. Flows rebounded briefly but dropped below the flow requirement again on June 15 and dropped to a low of 34 cfs at the Yreka USGS gage on June 16. The Division regularly communicated with the local watermaster, and Addendum 6 to Order WR 2024-0006-DWR reinstated conditional curtailments on June 16. The conditional curtailments require coordination and communication with the Scott Valley and Shasta Valley Watermaster District (Watermaster) and provide flexibility for more junior water right holders to divert in coordination with the Watermaster when the minimum flow requirement is met.
- **Shasta River Watershed Groundwater-Surface Water Model:** On May 7, 2026, the Division released a [Notice](#) of Opportunity for Public Comment and Virtual Meetings for the Draft Groundwater-Surface Water Model of Shasta River Watershed, related Draft Model Report, and a schematic of major water resources and diversions in the Shasta River watershed. The Division hosted virtual informational workshops via Zoom on May 28 (General Model Overview for Public) and June 3 (General Technical Training on Model for Modelers). The comment period was extended from June 12 to June 30.

New Bullards Bar Dam Atmospheric River Control Spillway Project: On May 14, 2026, the Executive Director issued a water quality certification for Yuba County Water Agency's New Bullards Bar Dam Atmospheric River Control Spillway Project (Project). The Project's purpose is to support flood risk reduction in the Yuba-Feather River system by enhancing reservoir release capacity and operational flexibility, particularly during high-flow events. The Project is located in Yuba County at New Bullards Bar Dam and involves construction and operation of a new spillway. The Project certification was requested as an amendment to Yuba County Water Agency's existing Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license for its Yuba River

Development Project. Sites Reservoir Project: On May 29, 2026, Division of Water Rights staff released for public comment a [draft water quality certification](#) for the Sites Project Authority's Sites Reservoir Project (Project). The comment period concludes on June 26, 2026. The Sites Project Authority is proposing construction of a new water surface reservoir that would divert water from the Sacramento River at Red Bluff and Hamilton City, to store up to 1.5 million acre-feet of water. The Project would be located in rural, unincorporated areas of Glenn and Colusa counties. Balch Hydroelectric Project: On June 3, 2026, Division of Water Rights staff released for public comment a draft water quality certification for the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) relicensing of Pacific Gas and Electric Company's Balch Hydroelectric Project (Project). In addition to continued operations, the proposed Project includes replacement and rehabilitation of existing recreation facilities, designation of existing roads and trails as Project roads and trails, decommissioning of Black Rock Creek and Weir Creek feeder facilities, modification of FERC Project boundary, and implementation of new protection, mitigation, and enhancement plans and measures. The Project is located on the North Fork Kings River in Fresno and Madera counties. Telemetry Pilot Project

The Russian River Telemetry Study has enrolled 63 volunteer stations as of June 3, 2026, with discussions underway for an additional 30 sites. Three Native American tribes have expressed interest in participating in the Study. The Division is currently consulting with tribal governments on site selection and contract development. Supply & Demand Assessment

The Division of Water Rights continues to develop water supply models, water demand datasets, and water allocation tools for select watersheds across California. These tools, once completed, will provide predictions of surface water supplies and demands to aid state and local water management decisions during periods of water shortage. Information on this work is available on the Board's Supply and Demand Assessment [webpage](#). Recent updates on this work are described below.

New Surface Water Demand Visualizations: The Division has published new dashboards where the public can interact with visualizations of surface water demands in the watersheds the Supply & Demand Assessment Program is modeling. The surface water demands are represented by diversion reporting data, which was reviewed and cleaned by the Division. Engagement Efforts: In June 2026, the Division met with the Russian River Water Sharing Program regarding the Russian River watershed and the Napa County Groundwater Sustainability Agency regarding the Napa River watershed.

Mono Lake Basin

Mono Lake Public Workshops: The Division of Water Rights held two informal public workshops on June 4 and 25, 2026, to collect information on the condition of Mono Basin's public trust resources and evaluate potential management options. The workshops focused on new data related to water quality, aquatic resources, and avian resources collected since the Board issued Water Right Decision 1631. DIVISION OF WATER QUALITY

Groundwater Quality Branch

Carbon Capture & Storage Program Updates: On September 16, 2022, Senate Bill 905 (Caballero) was adopted, establishing the framework for California's first Carbon Capture, Removal, Utilization, and Storage (CCUS) Program. State Water Board staff have worked closely with Regional Board staff, United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA), California Air Resources Board, California Natural Resources Agency, and Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory to develop this statewide effort.

CCUS covers all types of carbon capture and storage, however, the technology with the most storage potential is Class VI underground injection control (UIC). Class VI UIC projects inject ["CO₂"] into deep rock formations for permanent geologic sequestration/storage. Currently the U.S. EPA permits all Class VI UIC wells, but Water Board staff reviews each project for potential impacts to beneficial waters. Depending on the type and location of a CCUS project, the Water Boards may require additional permits.

On December 30, 2024, the first [Class VI UIC permits](#) were approved in California. Four permits were issued to Carbon TerraVault (CTV), a subsidiary of California Resources Corporation, to inject ["CO₂"] in the Elk Hills Oil Field for a duration of 26 years. Each permit requires final approval from the U.S. EPA before injection can commence.

On May 20, 2026, the U.S. EPA granted CTV final approval to inject in one of the four permitted wells. CTV [commenced injection](#) on May 26, 2026.

North Antelope Hills Aquifer Exemption: The California Geologic Energy Management Division ("CalGEM"), with the concurrence of the State Water Resources Control Board ("State Water Board") and the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board (collectively, the "Water Boards"), is considering recommending the United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) approve an aquifer exemption for a portion of the Tulare Oil Sand of the Tulare Formation in the North Antelope Hills Oil Field for Class II injection.

If approved by the US EPA, the proposed aquifer exemption would allow the State, in compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, to approve Class II injection into the identified areas. However, approval of the proposed aquifer exemption would not, by itself, authorize any new injection activity. Approval to operate a Class II injection project involves a regulatory process separate from aquifer exemption.

CalGEM and the State Water Board invite comments from the public regarding whether this aquifer exemption proposal meets the criteria for recommendation to the U.S. EPA. A public hearing of the proposal is scheduled to be held on July 16, 2026. The public comment period closes at 5 p.m. on July 31, 2026. Surface Water Regulatory Branch

Draft Review of State Water Quality Control Plans and State Policies for Water Quality

Control: On July 3, 2026, the State Water Board released the Draft Staff Report and Work Plan for the Review of State Water Quality Control Plans and State Policies for Water Quality Control (Review of State Plans and Policies) for public comment. The purpose of the Review of State Plans and Policies is to assess the adequacy of state plans and policies, as well as applicable water quality standards, to help guide the State Water Board's priorities for future projects to establish or amend state plans and policies.

The public comment period will close at noon on Tuesday, September 1, 2026. The State Water Board will hold a public hearing for the Review of State Plans and Policies on Tuesday, August 18, 2026. The Draft Staff Report and Work Plan, the Public Notice, and other project documents are available at the [Review of State Plans and Policies web page](#).

Draft Small Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit: State Water Board staff has developed a draft Small MS4 Permit (Draft Permit) for public comment in coordination with Regional Water Board staff, stakeholders, and interested parties. Staff released the Draft Permit on July 2, 2026 and will hold two public workshops on July 29, 2026 (virtual) and July 30, 2026 (in-person). The Draft Permit is a reissuance of the current 2013 permit, which expired in 2009 and has been administratively extended. The Draft Permit incorporates updated regulations and policies, including the Trash Provision and recently adopted TMDLs. It also incorporates public comments on an informal draft permit that was released in 2024 for a 60-day public comment period.

Utility Wildfire General Order: State law requires utility companies to prepare wildfire prevention plans, including vegetation management plans along utility corridors. The State Water Board has developed a draft order/permit for electric utilities that conduct wildfire mitigation and electric operations and maintenance activities with the potential to affect waters of the state. Board consideration of adoption of the proposed order is scheduled for August 19, 2026. The final proposed order and associated CEQA document and resolution will be released to the public no later than July 17, 2026.

Statewide Advisory Committee on Cooling Water Intake Structures Report: On March 20, 2026, the Statewide Advisory Committee on Cooling Water Intake Structures (SACCWIS), which advises the State Water Board on implementation of the Water Quality Control Policy on the Use of Coastal and Estuarine Waters for Power Plant Cooling (Once-Through Cooling or OTC Policy), convened and approved the 2026 Report of the SACCWIS. The SACCWIS provides a summary of the State of California's current electrical grid reliability needs in the report. The SACCWIS does not recommend any power plant compliance date extensions at this time. SACCWIS representatives will present an information item on the 2026 SACCWIS Report at the July 21, 2026, State Water Board meeting. University Enterprises Incorporated – PFAS Sampling Program

This program provides technical assistance to water systems for collecting and analyzing drinking water well samples for Per-and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) at all wells serving disadvantaged communities and severely disadvantaged communities, as required by State Water Board Order DW 2024-0002-DDW. Sampling and analysis services are provided by University Enterprises Incorporated, Office of Water Programs and their partners at no cost to the water systems. All drinking water wells will be sampled at least once. A second round of sampling will be decided by the State Water Board after the first round of sampling is complete. As of June 3, 2026, 100% of eligible water systems (1,106 of 1,106) are registered to be sampled and 3,361 wells out of the 3,375 scheduled have been sampled.

Administration/Operator Certification Branch

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT, RESEARCH AND ENFORCEMENT UNIT

ELAP Enforcement received 10 new referrals between May 12, 2026, through June 11, 2026, and had 8 on-site visits. Four corrective actions were approved that resulted in return to compliance for proper regulatory reporting. Additionally, ELAP Enforcement provided technical and compliance assistance to DDW district engineers for several issues involving regulatory data generated by ELAP accredited laboratories.

ELTAC MEETING

The Environmental Laboratory Technical Advisory Committee (ELTAC) had its biannual meeting on May 19, 2026. Topics included a demonstration of the new California Environmental Data Exchange Network (CEDEN) database, where laboratories provide results to the Water Boards for some monitoring. Multiple topics focused on impacts to the laboratory community, one being the upcoming US EPA rule on methylene chloride usage and another being on a shortage of helium. Recycled Water

DDW-Recycled Water Unit attended the Carpinteria Advanced Water Purification Project's (CAPP) groundbreaking ceremony on May 28, 2026. CAPP is a Groundwater Replenishment Reuse Project (GRRP) utilizing subsurface injection to recharge the aquifer with advanced treated wastewater. CAPP facilities comprise Carpinteria Sanitation District's (CSD) existing wastewater treatment plant (secondary effluent source wastewater) and the new advanced water treatment facility (AWTF). The AWTF process consists of membrane filtration (UF/MF), reverse osmosis and free chlorine advanced oxidation UV disinfection. A new pump station and conveyance pipeline will deliver treated water to two injection wells (IW). Monitoring wells for the aquifer zone(s) representing each injection and nearest drinking water well(s) will be constructed. The construction of CAPP and associated facilities for project start-up is expected to be completed in 2028. CAPP will provide 1.3 million gallons of advanced treated wastewater per day for replenishing the groundwater basin which represents approximately 25% of the area's water needs.

DDW will partner with Central Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board (CCRWQCB) to regulate CAPP for Title 22 recycled water criteria compliance and will evaluate the Title 22 Engineering Report for compliance with Title 22 recycled water criteria. Following a public hearing, a conditional acceptance letter will be issued for CAPP's Title 22 Engineering Report addressing the requirements to be included in CCRWQCB permit.

DDW Technical Operations Section completed final alarm testing at the Woodville ion exchange treatment plant for nitrate removal. The Woodville project was ten years in the making and included another system - Rio Bravo Greeley. DDW will now track real world O&M costs for these two small DAC systems.

Manganese Notification and Response Level

On June 2, 2026 DDW issued Notification and Response Levels for manganese, setting them at:

- Notification Level: 0.05 milligrams per liter (mg/L)
(Based on a running annual average)

- Response Level: 0.20 milligrams per liter (mg/L)
(Based on a single confirmed detection)

The Division considers the exceedance of the manganese response level to pose a potential health risk to formula-fed infants and recommends notifying customers to use an alternative water supply (bottled water) when preparing formula for infants. Accordingly, pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 116450, to reduce public exposure following a confirmed response level exceedance a community water system must notify customers to use an alternative water supply (bottled water) when preparing formula for infants, or mitigate the exposure until exceedances cease (take source offline, provide treatment or provision of alternative water).

The Division may require the same notice as described in the paragraph above for non-community water systems that serve a vulnerable population, as determined on a case-by-case basis.

Staff is planning to hold the following final general stakeholder meetings to discuss FY 2026-27 fees: July 30 – Water Quality and Water Rights and July 31 – Drinking Water and ELAP.

[Central Valley Water Board penalizes unpermitted growers:](#) J. S. Batth, Inc. and Jagpal S. Batth agreed to pay penalties of \$5,000 each for failing to enroll 72 and 124 acres of cropland, respectively, under the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program (ILRP). Although modest, the penalties underscore the importance of compliance and serve as a warning to other growers who remain outside the program. The ILRP establishes waste discharge requirements for commercial irrigated lands, and growers can comply either by joining a local water quality coalition or by obtaining individual permit coverage.

Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom Program

Memorial Pre-holiday Assessment

Each year the [SWAMP Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom \(FHAB\) Program](#) organizes pre-holiday assessments at high recreation sites before major holiday weekends including Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day to monitor harmful algal blooms. The FHAB Program funds most of the laboratory analyses and enlists assistance for the monitoring from Regional Boards, tribes, counties, irrigation districts, homeowners' associations, non-profits, and federal and state partners. For the Memorial Day pre-holiday assessment, 116 sites were monitored. A few sites monitored already exceeded the highest advisory level of danger advising the public to stay out of and off the water.

Statewide Pilot Benthic Cyanobacteria Ambient Monitoring Study

The [SWAMP Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom \(FHAB\) Program](#) convened a technical advisory committee consisting of researchers, and state and national experts over the winter to begin designing an ambient benthic cyanobacteria monitoring program for the state. As new monitoring is occurring for benthic cyanobacteria, often found in rivers and streams, cyanotoxins are being detected, which often include deadly neurotoxins. To better understand the spatial extent, timing of occurrence, and cyanotoxins detected in different parts of the state, the FHAB Program has made significant investments to design and implement a pilot study this summer. Multiple sites will be monitored focusing on spatial representation including southern California, Sierra Nevada mountains, Central Valley, and northern California. This is the first year of a multi-year planned study working with contractors at the Southern California Coastal Water Research Project, FHAB Program staff from State Board, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and Regions 1, 6, and 9, and volunteers from Ventura County.

Tribally-centered Freshwater Harmful Algal Bloom (FHAB) Monitoring Training Series

The [SWAMP Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom \(FHAB\) Program](#), in partnership with [California Tribal FHAB Monitoring experts](#), are offering a [tribally-centered FHAB Monitoring Training Series](#) in 2026.

The fifth course in the series was offered on May 27: FHAB Sample Collection Protocols & Processing. For the first five courses, over 60 individuals representing 35 California Tribes or Tribal organizations with interests in all nine Water Board Regions registered for and/or attended one or more courses in the series. Water Conservation

The response rate for the **April 2026** Urban Water Conservation Report is 90% as of the writing of this report (362 reports submitted). The estimated total production (accounting for missing reports) is 143.6 billion gallons (440.6 thousand acre-feet), and the statewide residential use is 79 gallons per capita per day.

The [Save Water](#) site received 204 water waste reports in May.

Staff released the [Urban Water Use Objective Dashboard](#), a new tool to explore supplier-level data from the Urban Water Use Objective reports. The regulation dashboard can be found on the Making Conservation a California Way of Life webpage.

The State Water Resources Control Board and its partners have launched *Getting to Efficiency*, a webinar series designed to help water suppliers understand and implement the requirements of Making Conservation a California Way of Life. The first session took place via Zoom on June 23, 2026, at 1:00 PM. Topics included a regulatory overview, technical requirements and data reporting, available resources, and an introduction to the technical assistance team. The session also covered the launch of the State Water Board's new hands-on data and reporting technical assistance pilot, led by the California Data Collaborative, with support from the California Water Efficiency Partnership. Climate

State Water Board staff placed first among participating state agencies and second overall in the May is Bike Month challenge hosted by the Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates and NorCal Go. The annual Bike Month event celebrates local bicycle culture and encourages new and experienced riders to replace their car emissions with bike trips.

June 2026

This month's Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program (ILRP) update provides a summary of significant activities of State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) staff for the month of May 2026; and the North Coast, San Francisco Bay, Central Coast, Los Angeles, Lahontan, Colorado River Basin, Santa Ana, and San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Water Boards) from April 1, 2026, to May 31, 2026. Next month's report will cover the Central Valley Regional Water Board's recent ILRP program activities and up-to-date data on compliance and outreach efforts.

State Water Board staff continued work to implement the Second Statewide Agricultural Expert Panel (Panel), as discussed in Order WQ 2023-0081, In the Matter of Review of General Waste Discharge Requirements for Discharges from Irrigated Lands Order No. R3-2021-0040 (Central Coast Ag Water Quality Order). The public comment period for the Panel's Draft Report closed on May 4. Staff compiled all received public comments and shared them with the Panel. Staff held two Panel Working Group Meetings on May 18, 2026, and May 27, 2026, to facilitate Panel deliberations of public comments received on the Panel's Draft Recommendations Report and edit the Draft Report as necessary. A final Plenary meeting was held on June 5, 2026 to make additional changes and to finalize the report. The Panel Chair presented the Final Report of Recommendations to the State Water Board during an Informational Item on June 16, 2026.

Public notices, meeting materials, and other panel documents can be found on the Expert Panel webpage. Staff encourages the public to sign up for the email list located on the main Agriculture webpage, which will be used to distribute program updates.

San Francisco Bay Regional Water Board staff continue to work with growers to answer questions and resolve discrepancies regarding individual fee invoices. Additionally, staff worked with new and existing responsible parties to terminate, enroll, or transfer property enrollments in the GeoTracker database as needed.

The **Central Coast Regional Water Board** released the draft revised Agricultural Order titled *Order R3-2021-0040-A1, as amended by State Water Board Order WQ 2023-0081* (Proposed Central Coast Agricultural Order) on May 26, 2026, for public review and comment. The Proposed Central Coast Agricultural Order amends current Order R3-2021-0040 and incorporates changes responsive to all the remands and direction in the State Water Board's Central Coast Ag Water Quality Order, including the direction to develop an alternative water supply program, "for residents relying on groundwater in areas where the maximum contaminant level (MCL) for nitrate is exceeded as a result of agricultural operations." The [Public Notice](#) and other available documents are on the [Central Coast Regional Water Board's web page](#).

Los Angeles Regional Water Board staff took part in the Outdoor Learning Lab located in The Farm section of the LA County Fair on May 7, 8, 21, and 22, 2026. At the booth, staff provided information about the Regional ILRP. During Fair Kids Days (May 21-22), local students had the opportunity to explore the Outdoor Learning Lab two hours before the fair opened to the public. Staff conducted an interactive demonstration on water infiltration, illustrating how pollutants travel through the aquifer and discussing practical ways to protect natural resources.

On May 15, 2026, Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) related Management Practice Plans were due for the Beardsley Wash and Malibu Coastal Responsibility Areas. Los Angeles Water Board Staff are in the process of reviewing the submitted plans.

Staff also conducted two site visits in Ventura County and one site visit in Los Angeles County to determine if those operations were subject to comply with the [Los Angeles Agricultural Order](#) (Order No. R4-2023-0353).

Colorado River Basin Regional Water Board adopted Order No. R7-2026-0017 on May 12, 2026, which is an amendment to the Colorado River Basin Water Quality Control Plan to establish TMDLs and an Implementation Plan for chloride and indicator bacteria in the Alamo River within Imperial County. Staff gave a presentation about the TMDL project and how it will be implemented through the [Imperial Valley Agricultural Order](#) (Order No. R7-2021-0050-03).

On May 19, 2026, the State Water Board approved an amendment to the Water Quality Control Plan for the Colorado River Basin to establish Total Maximum Daily Loads and Implementation Plan for Pyrethroid Pesticides in the Alamo River and New River within Imperial County. Staff gave a presentation about the TMDL project and how it will be implemented through the Imperial Valley Agricultural Order.

Santa Ana Regional Water Board approved the proposed request by the Western Riverside County Agricultural Coalition (WRCAC) to simplify the reporting process for monitoring on April 1, 2026. The proposal includes the implementation of a three-year Water Quality Index Agricultural Tool (WQIag tool) data reporting cycle (2026-2028) comprehensive annual dataset, where the reports for the first two years would consist of concise statistical summary comparisons against the 2025 baseline dataset. Then, the third year's report will provide an updated baseline comprehensive annual dataset for the next cycle. WRCAC's proposal was internally reviewed and approved, as the revised reporting system will satisfy requirements of the [Santa Ana Agricultural Order](#) (Order No. R8-2023-0006) and support WRCAC's long-term economic sustainability for dischargers.

In connection with the ongoing Statewide Agricultural Expert Panel, the Santa Ana Water Board submitted formal comments regarding the Panel's Draft Recommendation Report on April 30, 2026.

On May 20, 2026, a Notice of Termination (NOT) was issued, as required by the Santa Ana Agricultural Order.

The **North Coast, Lahontan, and San Diego Regional Water Boards** had no significant program updates from April 1, 2026, to May 31, 2026.
