DIVISION OF WATER RIGHTS

Permitting and Enforcement Branch

Approved Placer County Water Agency's temporary transfer: On August 10, 2026, the Division of Water Rights (Division) approved Placer County Water Agency's (PCWA's) temporary transfer of up to 21,053 acre-feet of water stored in French Meadows and Hell Hole reservoirs under Permit 13856 to Westlands Water District for agricultural use. The water would be released through the Middle Fork American River Project and Folsom Reservoir, conveyed through the Delta, and rediverted at the Jones or Banks pumping plants, with reservoir releases ending September 30, 2026. The Division determined that the transferred water would otherwise remain in storage and that, as conditioned, the transfer will not injure other legal users or unreasonably affect fish, wildlife, or other instream beneficial uses. Key conditions require PCWA to execute a reservoir refill agreement with the Department of Water Resources (DWR) and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation), coordinate Folsom operations and cold-water pool protection with Reclamation, comply with applicable regulatory and endangered-species requirements, and report transfer deliveries and subsequent reservoir refill.

Issued Administrative Civil Liability Complaint for violation of curtailment order on Scott River: On July 21, 2026, the Division issued a proposed Administrative Civil Liability Complaint alleging that Scott Valley Irrigation District (District), a junior water right holder, unlawfully continued diverting water during emergency curtailments in the Scott River watershed, potentially affecting salmonid fisheries and more senior water right holders. In calculating the liability, the Division applied enhanced curtailment penalties enacted by the Legislature in 2024 for the first time resulting in a statutory maximum penalty of \$1,051,000. Having considered all relevant factors, including the nature and potential impacts of the alleged violations, corrective actions, and the District's participation in groundwater recharge efforts, the Division proposed a penalty of \$300,000. The complaint contains allegations only, and the District may request a hearing before the Administrative Hearings Office before any final decision or penalty is imposed.

Issued five formal cannabis-related enforcement actions: On August 5, 2026, the Cannabis Enforcement Section issued an Administrative Civil Liability Order (ACLO),

two Administrative Civil Liability Complaints (ACLC), and two draft Cease and Desist Orders (CDO):

Waldo Cavillo of Trinity County was issued an ACLC on April 13, 2026, for failure to file a Statement of Water Diversion and Use (Statement), multiple Cannabis Policy violations and for diverting surface water for illegal cannabis cultivation without a Department of Cannabis Control (DCC) state license. The ACLC was issued in the amount of \$26,500 with a statutory maximum liability amount of \$883,500. An ACLO was issued to Mr. Cavillo on August 5, 2026, for failing to request a hearing within 20-days of receipt of the ACLC or paying the liability. The total proposed liability is due immediately (\$26,500).

Jeremy Hodys of Mendocino County was issued an ACLC and draft CDO for the unauthorized diversion or use of water for illegal cannabis cultivation, failure to file a Statement, Cannabis Policy violations, and diverting surface water for illegal cannabis cultivation without a DCC state license. The ACLC was issued to Mr. Hodys in the amount of \$40,000. The draft CDO requires Mr. Hodys to: 1) immediately cease the diversion of water to onstream storage, 2) obtain an appropriative water right, and 3) cease the diversion and use of water for cannabis cultivation until a DCC license is obtained to cultivate cannabis legally.

Jeremy Hodys and Ryan Shields of Mendocino County were issued an ACLC and draft CDO for multiple violations of unauthorized diversions or use of water for illegal cannabis cultivation, failure to file Statements, Cannabis Policy violations, and diverting water for illegal cannabis cultivation without a DCC state license. These violations were documented during a multi-year investigation (2023-2025) on 4 separate properties in Mendocino County. Division staff made several attempts to bring Mr. Hodys and Mr. Shields into compliance throughout the investigation and multi-year property inspections. The ACLC proposes a total liability amount of \$81,500 (\$41,000 (Hodys/Shields) + \$29,000 (Hodys) + \$11,500 (Shields)). The draft CDO requires Mr. Hodys and Mr. Shields to each: 1) cease their diversions of water to onstream storage, 2) both obtain an appropriative water right, and 3) cease the diversion and use of water for cannabis cultivation until a DCC license is obtained to cultivate cannabis legally. Groundwater Recharge

Received Town of Windsor's recharge permit: The Division of Water Rights is now processing its first recharge temporary water right permit for the upcoming water year. On July 31, 2026, the Town of Windsor (Town) submitted application T033545 for a 5-year temporary permit to divert up to 200 acre-feet from the Russian River. The Town included a completed California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) document as part of their application. Staff are currently preparing public notice of the project.

Bay Delta, Hearings, and Special Projects Branch

Release Final Draft Sacramento/Delta Update to the Bay-Delta Plan:

On August 19, 2026, State Water Board staff released for public review and comment a final draft of updates to the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Watershed (Bay-Delta Plan or Plan). The changes are focused on the portions of the Plan relevant to the Sacramento River watershed, Delta eastside tributaries (including the Calaveras, Consumnes, and Mokelumne Rivers), and Delta (Sacramento/Delta) for the reasonable protection of fish and wildlife beneficial uses. The State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) also released the final Staff Report/Substitute Environmental Document (Staff Report) in support of Sacramento/Delta updates to the Bay-Delta Plan, which includes responses to previously submitted comments. The final draft Bay-Delta Plan and final Staff Report include revisions based on public comments.

In addition, the State Water Board has finalized the Scientific Basis Report Supplement in support of voluntary agreements (VAs), also referred to the Healthy Rivers and Landscapes (HRL) proposal, for the Sacramento/Delta update to the Bay-Delta Plan. The final Scientific Basis Report Supplement includes revisions and responses to peer reviewer comments and is included as Appendix G2 to the final Staff Report. The State Water Board is accepting written comments on changes made to the final draft Bay-Delta Plan since the December 2025 revised draft. Written comments are due September 18, 2026. The State Water Board will consider adoption of the final draft Bay-Delta Plan and supporting final Staff Report at a public meeting scheduled for October 28–29, 2026, where the public will have an opportunity to provide oral comments. Responding to Joint Points of Diversion (JPOD) Request: On July 24, the Division of Water Rights received a request from Department of Water Resources (DWR) and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) to use Stage 2 JPOD for planned maintenance from September 2026 through mid-January 2027. State Water Board Decision 1641 allows DWR and Reclamation to use each other's points of diversion in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to divert or redivert water under certain conditions. The Division is currently evaluating the request.

Water Rights Modernization

Updating Water Rights Data for California (UPWARD)

CalWATRS receives “Best Application Serving the Public Award:” Presented by Government Technology Magazine and the Center for Digital Government, the Best of California Awards recognize the outstanding work of California state and local government leaders and organizations that are transforming public service through technology. This award will be presented at the California Government Technology Summit on August 25 at the SAFE Credit Union Convention Center in Sacramento.

Telemetry Pilot Project

The Russian River Telemetry Study gains more participants: 79 volunteer stations have enrolled in the program as of August 7, 2026, with discussions underway for an additional 25 sites. Site installation is ongoing in consultation with tribes, with substantial collaboration with the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria. All sites are planned to be installed by December 1, 2026. Supply & Demand Assessment

New Surface Water Demand Visualizations now available: The Division recently published surface water demand visualizations for nine additional watersheds (Big Creek, Pescadero Creek, Petaluma River, Pismo and San Luis Obispo Creeks, San Gregario Creek, San Lorenzo River, Sonoma Creek, Tomales-Drakes Bay, and Trinity River) and there are now demand visualizations for each of the watersheds where supply model development is underway. The visualizations allow the public to easily explore the demand datasets, which were developed by staff based on user-submitted water diversion reports. Users can explore the spatial distribution of reported diversions and, as supply models are completed, track evolving supply and demand metrics within each watershed. University Enterprises Incorporated – PFAS Sampling Program

This program provides technical assistance to water systems for collecting and analyzing drinking water well samples for Per-and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) at all wells serving disadvantaged communities and severely disadvantaged communities, as required by State Water Board Order DW 2024-0002-DDW. Sampling and analysis services are provided by University Enterprises Incorporated, Office of Water Programs and their partners at no cost to the water systems. All drinking water wells will be sampled at least once. A second round of sampling will be decided by the State Water Board after the first round of sampling is complete. As of August 3, 2026, 100% of eligible water systems (1,106 of 1,106) are registered to be sampled and 3,361 wells out of the 3,375 scheduled have been sampled.

Cleanup Fund

Underground Storage Tank (UST) Cleanup (information as of 7/31/2026):

Program Activity

Claims Program

- In FY 2025-26, 151 applications were received, where 74% were for cases where cleanup work was completed
- There are 18 claims on the Priority List waiting to receive a Letter of Commitment, which enables eligible claimants to begin submitting Reimbursement Requests (RR) for eligible cost reimbursement. The Priority List is comprised of 18 Priority D claims. These claims are associated with regulatory cases that are closed and no longer incurring cleanup costs. Claims on the Priority List continue to be activated in real time.
- In fiscal year 2025-26, 181 claims were activated. 88% of the claims activated were for priority D claims.
- There are 3,276 active claims that can submit RRs for eligible cost reimbursement with more than 83% of them being Priority Class D claims.

Claims Reimbursements

- For fiscal year 2024 budget, the Fund received \$180 million in budget authority for claims reimbursement. Of the \$180 million, \$126 million is committed and \$77 million of the committed amount has already been reimbursed against this authority.
- For fiscal year 2025 budget, the Fund received \$80 million in budget authority for claims reimbursement. The Fund will begin utilizing this funding during the first quarter of this fiscal year. For fiscal year 2026 budget, the Fund also received \$80 million in budget authority.
- During the first month of this fiscal year, approximately 162 reimbursement requests (\$11.4 million) have been submitted through FI\$Cal for payment processing. Last fiscal year, a total of 1571 RRs (\$137 million) were approved and paid.

UST Case/Claim Closure

- For fiscal year 2026-27, Fund staff anticipate completing 200 Review Summary Reports (RSRs) and have completed 12 RSRs for this fiscal year. In fiscal year 2025-26, 267 RSRs were completed.
- During fiscal year 2026-27, Fund staff anticipate closing 300 Underground Storage Tank Cleanup Fund (USTCF) claims with closed cases. In fiscal year 2025-26, 329 USTCF claims were closed with closed cases.

Expedited Claim Account Program (ECAP)

- Since inception, there have been 323 claims accepted into the ECAP program. Approximately \$87.4 million of the \$100 million total allocated funding has been paid for corrective action costs.
- Currently, there are a total of 108 active claims within ECAP, including 4 new claims added last fiscal year.
- 22 cases were closed in fiscal year 2025-26 in GeoTracker. There are another 29 claims eligible for closure.

Grant Programs

- The **Orphan Site Cleanup Fund (OSCF)** received 22 new applications seeking eligibility into the program in fiscal year 2025-26 requesting \$6.5 million. In fiscal year 2025-26, 44 projects were funded for \$12.8 million. Staff processed reimbursements for \$7.4 million. There are currently 13 eligible projects on the priority list with an estimated funding request of \$6.3 million.

- The **Site Cleanup Subaccount Program** (SCAP) has committed over \$219 million in grants and contracts since inception. Launch of CEDEN 2.0 Data Portal

The California Environmental Data Exchange Network (CEDEN) is a central location to find and share information about California's water bodies, including streams, lakes, rivers, and the coastal ocean. CEDEN aggregates water quality data and makes it accessible to environmental managers and the public and is the main data submission portal for data that is assessed in the Integrated Report.

CEDEN 2.0 is a new data submission portal for CEDEN that is open for public use starting on August 17, 2026. The first data type to transition to the new data system is Chemistry (Water Quality) data. Other data types (tissue, toxicity, etc.) will transition in the coming years.

The goals of the CEDEN 2.0 data submission portal are: (1) a user-friendly interface that educates submitters about data quality, (2) improved understanding of data quality for all users through automated checks, and (3) a modern, secure data system.

Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom Program

Independence Day Pre-holiday Assessment

The [SWAMP Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom \(FHAB\) Program](#) organizes pre-holiday assessments at high recreation sites before major holiday weekends including Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day to monitor for harmful algal blooms. The FHAB Program funds most of the laboratory analyses and enlists assistance for the monitoring from Regional Boards, tribes, counties, irrigation districts, homeowners' associations, non-profits, and federal and state partners. The last assessment is underway and will be published by September 4th.

The latest Fourth of July pre-holiday assessment monitored 122 sites. Monitoring results trigger public health advisories ranging from no swimming to the highest advisory level of danger advising the public to stay out of and off the water. The monitoring results and all event response to public reports are published to the HAB Reports Map at: [HAB Reports Map | Harmful Algal Blooms \(HABs\)](#).

The Clean Water Team Provides Support for Coho and North Coast Watersheds

This past May the Clean Water Team met with Community Based Organizations and North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board (NCRWQCB) staff. The Atascadero/Green Valley Watershed Council ([AGCWC](#)) is dedicated to inspiring collective action to protect and foster a flourishing watershed through advocacy, education, and community engagement. The Clean Water Team met with AGCWC staff in the field to discuss their water quality monitoring program. The Clean Water Team then provided a workshop for AGCWC's volunteers. Atascadero Creek falls within the Green Valley Creek watershed which is listed as a core watershed for recovery in NMFS' recovery plan for the CCC ESU of Coho Salmon (NMFS 2012) and Green Valley Creek is a focus stream for the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) North Coast Salmon Project.

The Clean Water Team also facilitated a meeting between NCRWQCB staff and the California Urban Streams Alliance (aka The Stream Team) to discuss the Gualala River and Navaro River watersheds. The Stream Team has been working in these watersheds

engaging community in effective water quality monitoring and watershed stewardship. Results of measurable outcomes from management practices are shared with community members and government agencies for data driven decision making.

The Clean Water Team has provided technical and programmatic assistance to the Stream Team and this meeting with NCRWQCB staff helped the Stream Team better align its watershed programs such as storm water pollution prevention, filling data gaps (baseline water quality monitoring data, 6PPD-Q, etc.) for healthier watersheds.

OFFICE OF RESEARCH, PLANNING, AND PERFORMANCE

Water Conservation

The response rate for the **June 2026** Urban Water Conservation Report is 90% as of the writing of this report (364 reports submitted). The estimated total production (accounting for missing reports) is 179.9 billion gallons (552.2 thousand acre-feet), and the statewide residential use is 90 gallons per capita per day.

On August 5, the Office ran a webinar, in partnership with the California Data Collaborative and the California Water Efficiency Partnership, to provide information that will help urban retail water suppliers submit required water use efficiency reports for fiscal year 2025-26. Resources related to this ongoing webinar series are available on the Board's website at: [Getting to Efficiency: A Technical Assistance Webinar Series for Making Conservation a California Way of Life](#). There, suppliers can find recordings of the August 5th and a previous webinar, can sign up for emails, and find contact information.

The [Save Water](#) site received 279 water waste reports in July.

August 2026

This month's Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program (ILRP) update provides a summary of significant activities of State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) staff for the month of July 2026; and the North Coast, San Francisco Bay, Central Coast, Los Angeles, Lahontan, Colorado River Basin, Santa Ana, and San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Water Boards) from June 1, 2026, to July 31, 2026. Next month's report will cover the Central Valley Regional Water Board's recent ILRP program activities and up-to-date data on compliance and outreach efforts.

State Water Board staff continues reviewing the [Final Expert Panel Recommendations Report](#) (Final Report), which was the result of the Second Statewide Agricultural Expert Panel (Panel), as discussed in [Order WQ 2023-0081](#), *In the Matter of Review of General Waste Discharge Requirements for Discharges from Irrigated Lands Order No. R3-2021-0040* (Central Coast Ag Water Quality Order). More information on the Panel can be found on the [Expert Panel webpage](#). The ADA-formatted Final Report was published on the Expert Panel webpage on July 30, 2026.

State Water Board staff is coordinating a Regional Board Workshop to facilitate Regional Boards input on the Panel recommendations and inform the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program improvement process. The Workshop is anticipated to occur late 2026 or early 2027.

Staff encourages the public to sign up for the email list located on the main [Agriculture webpage](#) for ILRP updates, including information on future public meetings and engagement opportunities.

San Francisco Bay Regional Water Board staff worked with the State Water Board's GeoTracker team to clarify the online Annual Report form.

Staff sent reminders to complete the Annual Report form to a subset of growers who do not have a Tier 1 Farm Plan and have not yet submitted their Annual Reports. This outreach led to several inquiries from enrollees and will inform enrollment updates ahead of the invoicing cycle in the fall.

Central Coast Regional Water Board staff hosted a [public workshop](#) on June 18, 2026, which provided members of the public with an opportunity to provide input on the proposed revisions to the Central Coast Ag Order (R3-2021-0040). Comments were accepted on the Proposed Order (Order R3-2021-0040-A1, as amended by State Water Board Order WQ 2023-0081) and supporting documents. Central Coast Water Board staff also provided presentations on the Proposed Order at the workshop. Although there was a quorum of Central Coast Water Board members, no Board action was taken at the workshop.

The proposed revisions to the Central Coast Ag Order are responsive to the State Water Quality Control Board (State Water Board) remands and direction to develop an alternative water supply program in [Order WQ 2023-0081](#).

A [Public Notice](#) announcing the availability of the [Proposed Order and associated documents](#) was released on May 26, 2026, and provided information on how to download or request documents available for public comment. Written public comments were received between May 26, 2026, and 5 PM on July 20, 2026. Written comments were only accepted on the proposed revisions to the Ag Order and the attachments listed below, including (but not limited to) the development of the alternative water supply program. Documents made available for public comment included the following:

Colorado River Basin Regional Water Board staff provided background information on the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program to the Colorado River Basin Water Board on July 14, 2026. Additionally, staff discussed the Panel findings presented by State Water Board staff and panel Chair Dr. Daniel Geisseler that was completed June 16, 2026. Staff addressed recommendations from the Panel and how the Final Report could affect the regional ILRP.

The Palo Verde Outfall Coalition staff visited the Colorado River Basin Water Board staff in Palm Desert on July 15, 2026. Colorado River Basin Regional Board's Executive Officer (EO) and staff met with the new coalition project manager and their three Board members. Annual Monitoring Report and Irrigation Nitrogen Management Plan requirements were discussed. Staff and the coalition had a productive discussion about their expectations and their obligations under [Order No. R7-2019-0030](#).

The Colorado River Basin Water Board EO approved the Bard Unit Coalition Group Nitrogen Coefficient Report for crops that cover 99% of acreage within the Coalition on July 20, 2026.

The **North Coast, Los Angeles, Lahontan, Santa Ana and San Diego Regional Water Boards** had no significant program updates from June 1, 2026, to July 31, 2026.
