Dear Chairwoman Marcus:

Trout Unlimited (TU) and the Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations (PCFFA)<sup>1</sup> submit the following letters on behalf of the undersigned business owners and operators and trade associations who represent fishermen who catch salmon, steelhead and other fisheries of the San Francisco Bay estuary and coastal waters; restaurants, marinas, seafood markets and processors, and supporting businesses that sustain fishing jobs; fishing guides and charter boat operators who take more than 300,000 Californians fishing each year for salmon, sturgeon, and steelhead; rafting outfitters that take people on trips in the Central Valley and throughout California; local bait and tackle shops that supply rods, reels, lures and tackle to fishermen; and many other businesses that depend on a vibrant tourism industry. On December 19, 2014, TU, the Bay Institute, and the Tuolumne River Trust (TRT) submitted letters on behalf of over 100 business owners, operators and representatives urging the State Water Resources Control Board (Board) to use its authority to set protective flow standards on the lower San Joaquin River and its tributaries in order to restore fisheries and recreational uses (the letters are attached). Through these letters, these business leaders renew their request. Additionally, the business owners listed below join in the request.

These businesses, while different, all rely on the health of Central Valley rivers and the San Francisco Bay-Delta. Healthy rivers and abundant salmon and steelhead mean business for California: from the docks to the upper watershed, healthy salmon and steelhead runs and wild rivers support thriving businesses. Unfortunately, the waterways on which our businesses rely have been degraded for years. Our businesses and livelihoods have been impacted and, in some

The signatories to the attached letters appreciate the Board's efforts to date to adopt new water quality standards (which would set minimum requirements for the amount of inflow from the rivers of the San Joaquin basin), that seek to achieve a better balance between the many competing uses of the public's water resources. Unfortunately, the Board's most recent proposal to update water quality standards does not go far enough toward restoring the long-lost balance between those who extract water from the San Joaquin River and the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, and those, like us, whose businesses and livelihoods depend on leaving more water flowing from the southern Sierra Nevada to the sea.

We urge the Board to fairly weigh the needs of fisheries and recreational beneficial uses by sincerely considering the benefits our businesses (and other like us) receive from a functioning river ecosystem and the significant economic benefits we provide to California's economy when our businesses are healthy. This is a once-in-a-generation opportunity for the Board to reverse decades of declining fisheries, water quality conditions, and fresh water flow rates by revising its proposed water quality standards for San Joaquin flows to the estuary in order to fully protect our fisheries.

RE: BUSINESSES SUPPORT ADEQUATE FLOWS FROM THE  
LOWER SAN JOAQUIN RIVER AND ITS TRIBUTARIES TO RESTORE FISHERIES AND  
WATER QUALITY

Dear State Water Board Members:

Over two years ago, we wrote to urge you to use your authority, in the initial phase of setting new water quality standards for the San Francisco Bay-Delta estuary, to ensure adequate flows on the lower San Joaquin River and its tributaries, in order to restore fisheries and recreational uses. As we stated at the time, our businesses rely on people who come to San Francisco and Northern California to enjoy our Bay and nearshore ocean, or who create a broader demand for our wild-caught, sustainable seafood. The health of these ecosystems depends on adequate fresh water flows from the Central Valley's rivers into the Bay-Delta. Healthy rivers and abundant salmon, steelhead, sturgeon, and herring populations mean business for San Francisco and Northern California.

Now, more than two years later, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) has still not acted. Conditions in the Bay-Delta and its watershed, on which we depend in large part for our livelihood, are even worse than we first wrote the SWRCB urging action. Over the last few years Central Valley salmon runs have been decimated by the failure to comply with current flow requirements, let alone adopt and implement new, stronger ones. The SWRCB's latest proposed regulations would fail to provide the conditions needed to improve fisheries and water quality, and protect our jobs and livelihoods. Again, we urge the SWRCB to fully consider the benefits businesses like ours, and California's economy in general, receive from functioning river and estuarine ecosystems, and to take appropriate action. The actions the SWRCB should take include:

- Requiring at least half (and as close to 60% as possible) of the San Joaquin River's natural flow to reach the Delta during the first six months of each year, to ensure that anadromous fish populations can achieve positive growth and comply with the state's doubling goal.
- Ensuring that these improved flows are released in a manner that, to the maximum extent possible, tracks natural runoff patterns (magnitude, duration, timing, and frequency).



- Basing the adaptive management of flows and other non-flow restoration measures on the attainment of specific and measurable biological and physical outcomes (particularly, the SWRCB's narrative objective for salmon doubling and other state and federal goals for doubling of anadromous fish populations).
- Providing flows in summer and fall that are sufficient to maintain fish and wildlife, water quality, and recreational benefits in the Bay-Delta, lower San Joaquin, and San Joaquin tributaries.

Our businesses are directly and adversely affected when too much water is diverted from Central Valley rivers and the Bay-Delta estuary. For decades, state policy has favored those who divert at unsustainable levels over the tourism (the state's largest) and seafood industries that are harmed when our rivers have too little water and too few fish. The resulting decline in fisheries and water quality has contributed to historic closures of the salmon fishery, with devastating impacts to thousands of men and women whose livelihood depends on that fishery. We look to the SWRCB to correct the imbalance between those who extract water from the San Joaquin River and San Francisco Bay-Delta, and those, like us, whose businesses and livelihoods depend on leaving more water flowing from the southern Sierra Nevada to the sea.
