Joann,

While the Tentative Order provides numerous data sets, there are no useful maps integrating this information with actual locations, sensitive habitat, recreational areas and key federally protected marine mammal migration and foraging sites. Accurate, timely maps are fundamental for the Public's understanding of SDRWQCB regulated coastal receiving waters.

Mapped layers indicating imperiled creeks, the actual extent of coastal urban runoff plumes, sewage spills, Harmful Algae Blooms sites, Marine Protected Areas, kelp forests and tidepools, major recreation sites, secondary sewage outfalls, coastal currents and cross sections of ocean upwelling (see attached) are more useful than charts and technocratic tables in developing a genuinely integrated depiction of water quality impacts to the region's creeks and coastal waters.

The Marine Life Protection Act (MLPA) was guided by detailed maps of key features and activities along the California coast. These layered maps greatly facilitated deliberations and designations of MPAs by giving everyone a basic point of departure based upon actual conditions. SDRWQCB staff may benefit from collaborating with MLPA map professionals to develop detailed maps for Public education, review and comment. <http://southcoast.marinemap.org/marinemap/>

Thank you for incorporating useful maps among your various extensive documents. Without a good map, we cannot chart sustainable solutions to creek and coastal pollution.
