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NCTD pulls dirt from Loma Alta over weekend


By: PAUL SISSON - Staff Writer Industry Street businesses hope the move will prevent flooding

OCEANSIDE -- Spurred by businesses that recently flooded along Industry Street, the North County Transit District removed tons of soil from the Loma Alta creek bed over the weekend.

Tom Kelleher, a spokesman for the transit district, said Monday afternoon that earthmoving equipment excavated the southern bank of the creek bed on Saturday and Sunday after obtaining emergency clearing permits from the Army Corps of Engineers.

"I am told 1,400 cubic yards of soil was removed," Kelleher said in an e-mail.

On Nov. 30, a winter storm caused Loma Alta to swell and jump its northern bank, flooding several businesses along Industry Street. A rainstorm on Jan. 7 brought more flooding to some of the same businesses. Many business owners pointed to the new Sprinter light rail line, whose tracks runs along the Loma Alta's southern bank. Sprinter construction raised the tracks by up to five feet in some locations, and

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business owners have said publicly that doing so narrowed the creek channel and pushed flood waters onto private property.


The Nov. 30 storm filled Weiland Sliding Doors and Windows on Industry Street with water, despite piles of sandbags at every entrance and an earthen berm designed to prevent the creek from getting too close.

After that flood, the business installed concrete barriers and heavy-duty doors at each of its entrances. Those doors kept the water out of the business's main building when the creek rose again on Jan. 7 but did not prevent much of the low-lying property from flooding.

Steve Donner, the company's general manager, said Monday that he saw a few pictures of the weekend clearing effort that the transit district performed. He said he was not sure what to make of the excavation, which is supposed to let the creek flow more freely.

"We're happy with any efforts, but the proof will be in the next storm," Donner said.

Oceanside City Manager Peter Weiss said Monday that he thought the transit district's clearing effort will make a difference the next time it rains.
