Comment Letter – Prohibiting Wasteful Water Use Practices

The City of Santa Ana appreciates the opportunity to provide input to the State Water Resources Control Board (State Board) proposed Water Conservation Regulations. The City provides the following comments:

<u>Subdivision (b)(1) (G):</u> The new regulation will restrict the irrigation of medians and verges/parkways and differs from the emergency regulation which only restricted irrigation of ornamental turf on street medians. The proposed rule should not include verges and parkways in the restriction for the environmental benefits they provide. Turf grasses stabilize the soil and enhance safety by reducing run-off and diminishing soil erosion.

It is recommended that the proposed regulations define local residential streets with medians that are adjacent to a neighborhood aesthetic gateway and officially considered a residential street according to the City's General Plan/Circulation Element and as not a public street. Therefore having grass in the residential neighborhood gateway medians and providing irrigation with potable water should not be considered wasteful water use practices.

General Comment: If the proposed regulation is approved, cities will incur significant costs by re-landscaping medians and parkways. This unbudgeted expenditure may force cities and counties to cut services or programs in other areas in order to comply. The cost for cities and counties to remove turf in medians and verges represents a significant financial burden that does not appear to be considered in the Economic and Fiscal Impacts of the Proposed Regulation to Permanently Prohibit Certain Wasteful Water Use Practices dated November 1, 2017. The cost to retrofit these landscapes should be considered. According to the Orange County Chapter of the California Landscape Contractors Association, the cost to convert a landscaped area to conform

to this regulation can be up to \$8 per square foot. The City of Santa Ana contains over 2.5 million square feet of median and parkway landscaping and translates into tens of millions of dollars in conversion costs.
