I support the Water Board's proposed revocation of the water rights permits held by the Bureau of Reclamation for the Auburn Dam Project. Revoking these permits will allow the water to be put to true beneficial use and will help ensure that the outstanding natural resources of the American River are protected for the future. Revocation will also help bring existing allocations in line with existing uses.

A large multi-use dam on the American River would drown 50 miles of river canyon visited by more than a million Californians annually for outdoor recreation. The dam would also destroy the river's rich environmental and cultural resources as well. These water permits have been held by the Bureau for over 35 years without action. Auburn Dam continues to have no financial support, insufficient legislative support, and because of seismic safety and environmental concerns, as well as inflating costs, is certainly not supported by most Californians. 
