Subject: MPWMD - RULE 24 - CALCULATION OF WATER USE CAPACITY.

Hello Mr O'Hagan,

MPWMD Rule 24 (link below) describes the District's methodologies for estimating a site's approximate annual "Water Use Capacity" in acre-feet.

All District water accounting is computed in acre-feet. However, the District uses different methodologies depending on whether it's a residential or commercial use.

(A) - For residential uses the District uses "Fixture Units" with one fixture unit being equivalent to 0.01 acre-feet (per year) of water. I believe the intent was to make the residential accounting scheme easier for people to understand by avoiding fractional values as much as possible. The conversion to acre-feet is done by the District, not by the applicant but in the end everything is accounted for in acre-feet.

(B) - For commercial (non-residential) uses the District uses "Use Factors" which are directly expressed in acre-feet (per year).

In the end, everything is done (permits/credits/debits, etc) in acre-feet.
